

Road Safety, the municipality had to participate on raising awareness targeted at motorists, pedestrians and all other road users on issues • around road safety.

The 18th of November 2011, was also declared by the Minister of Transport, Honourable • Sibusiso Ndebele as the National Day of Prayer for Road Safety. That day formed part of commemorations for the World Day of

Remembrance for Road Traffic Victims on 20 November and also to mourn the 1,3 million people who lost their lives and the millions of others who were injured on the world's roads this year. The 2011 theme as declared by Minister is as follows "From Global Remembrance to Global Action across the Decade '` Let's make 2011-2020 a decade to remember!

A speaker for the Mayoral Committee, responsible for Community Development Services at the District Municipality asked the community to bear in mind the following while driving during the festive season:

- To communicate to other road users any hazardous conditions along the road you
- Adherence to the prescribed speed limit;
- All occupants of a vehicle must wear their seatbelts;
- Drivers and vehicles must be licensed;
- Vehicle roadworthiness must be up to

- To take a rest stop after every two hours

Ladies and Gentlemen, we cannot ignore the statistics that revealed the following heart breaking figures:

- Africa has the highest road death rate per population in the world;
- Africa's road deaths are currently over 200 000 a year and are predicted to rise by at least 80% by
- By 2015, road accidents will be the leading killer of children aged 5-15 in Africa, even surpassing malaria and HIV/Aids;
- Road accidents are estimated to cost African countries between 1-3% of their Gross National Product; and
- Fourty percent of the victims from the estimated 10 thousand roads accidents that take place in South Africa every year, are vulnerable road users such as pedestrians, cyclists and those using motorized two or three wheelers.
