Rustenburg/ Phokeng -Tlholego Learning Centre and Eco Village is conducting an International Permaculture Design Certification Course that will run from 27 November – 10 December 2011 as part of efforts to ensure that farmers are aware of environmentally friendly agricultural methods. A total of 45 participants are currently attending the two week Internationally recognised Permaculture Design Course at the Tlholego Eco Village, which is situated on the R52 Koster Road. Participants from as far afield as Swaziland, Cape Town, Zimbabwe, Limpopo, Kwa-Zulu Natal, Eastern Cape, Gauteng and North West are taking part in the training course.

The Royal Bafokeng Platinum Mine has sponsored 26 members from four Bafokeng villages - Chaneng, Mafenya, Rasimone and Robega – for training as well as 'The Mystery Farmers', who are a great example of enthusiastic young emerging farmers. Speaking to Platinum Weekly, Stephne Fain - the Programme Director of Tlholego Learning Centre and Tlholego Learning Centre Eco village – said the training is appropriate as it coincides with the COP 17/

CMP 7 conference, which is being held in Durban.

Info Bill - Yay or Nay?

State Security Minister Siyabonga Cwele again defended the Protection of State Information Bill and argued the intention was not to gag the media. Cwele said the controversial bill was not about regulating journalists. The National Assembly passed the bill in November, amid calls for a public interest clause. Cwele said such a clause would weaken the efficacy of the bill. "It is not about punishing the journalists. It is about the information which may be in the public domain and that there will be no recourse. If you can find a solution to that, how do we ensure that the sensitive information cannot be disclosed," the minister said.

He further defended the ANC and argued public consultations were conducted which informed the amendments to the bill. "Anything, really, if it is valid, we will always consider it. We have been engaging. When we started the bill, the previous version of the bill, we were quite far apart," he said. Meanwhile, Democratic Alliance (DA) leader Helen Zille committed her party on Thursday to fight the Protection of State Information Bill on several fronts. "Black Tuesday", when the bill was approved by the National Assembly, would one day be seen as a turning point in South Africa's democracy, she told a media briefing at Parliament. "Whatever happens in the months ahead, Tuesday will be remembered as the day that the ANC voted against media freedom, a cornerstone of our democracy." Some

people had resigned themselves to a

future under the act, with the censor-

ship implications thought to have died with apartheid. "The DA has not given up. Far from it. We have fought against the bill since its inception and we will keep on fighting. This legislation has no place in a free and democratic South Africa," Zille said.

Among other things, she had asked President Jacob Zuma for an urgent meeting to discuss the immediate as well as the far-reaching implications of the bill for South Africa. "News of the vote in the National Assembly has been covered worldwide. Human Rights Watch, for example, described it as 'a blow to freedom of expression and democratic accountability'," she said.

The response of the international currency markets was immediate. The rand slumped to a 30-month low, which analysts attributed to growing international reservations about South Africa's future. In the meantime, in just 48 hours, approximately 10 000 people have sent an e-mail to President Jacob Zuma from AfriForum's webpage www. thebillstopshere.co.za to voice their protest against the controversial Protection of State Information Bill. The 10 000 mark was surpassed at 15:45 the same day, said Ernst Roets, Deputy CEO of AfriForum.

Publicity for the webpage was mainly generated through social media like Facebook and Twitter, Roets said.

"We're extremely impressed with the positive response that has been received so far. The rate at which e-mails

are coming in has not slowed down and

we therefore expect this 10 000 mark to

be just the beginning of the campaign. The overwhelming response shows how strongly the public are opposed to the Bill and how out of touch the ruling party is with the public's frustrations over this issue." Roets urged people to visit the webpage at www.thebillstopshere.co.za and to raise awareness through social media. People can also text the word "STOP" to 38655 to make a donation to the legal costs for a Constitutional Court application, should the Bill be signed by the President. The email addressed to the State President reads as follows: "I, the undersigned South African citizen, would hereby like to state my concern with the so-called Protection of State Information Bill. I am of the opinion that the Bill in its current form will be detrimental to accountability and effective governance in South Africa, that it will have a negative impact on the fight against corruption, and that it will severely curtail the role of the media as a watchdog of society. I hereby request that you prevent this Bill from becoming a law by refraining from signing it."

The e-mail petition is part of AfriForum's five-point plan to stop the Bill from being enacted. The plan can also be found on the webpage.
