classes in a wheelchair. Other learners accepted as pupils include victims of Asperger's Syndrome, a girl with one arm, a boy with severe hearing loss, a boy with multiple physical handicaps and a girl suffering from a life-threatening illness. If the school is in the position to help, then the school deems it necessary to help and to make sure that the child in question is secure and happy at school.

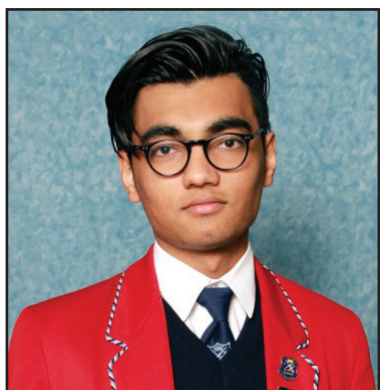

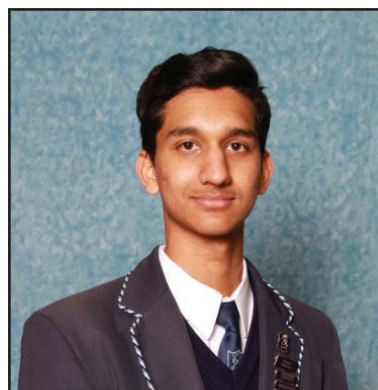
