# KIDS! Make a difference through your art



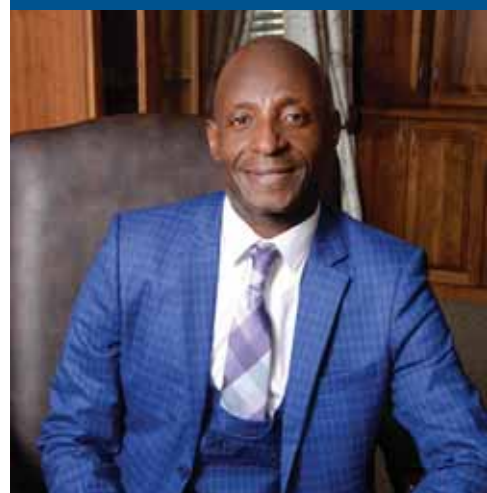
**Rustenburg** – Calling all grade 6 to 10 learners! It's time to put on your thinking caps and grab your favourite paint brush.
