# NEW RUSTENBURG MALL COMING SOON

**Rustenburg** – The construction of a new mall measuring 75 000 square meters is expected to create almost 3 000 jobs and is set to begin before year-end. This was revealed by chairman of JB Holdings, Roux Shabangu during a VIP sod turning ceremony held on the site of the future mall on Tuesday 6 August. “We are standing here today to launch a project that we believe will be a resounding success. Planning for this project started 13 years ago,” he said.

Rustenburg executive mayor councillor Mpho Khunou said that the construction of the facility is in line with the city’s 2040 masterplan. “We would like Rustenburg to become an investment vehicle in the province and this should also create jobs for our people,” he said. JB Holdings along with Moolman Group and Twin City Development will be spearheading the construction of this mall at a cost of approximately R1.5billion.

Conroy van der Westhuizen, general manager of corporate social investment (CSI) at Glencore, explained the decision behind assisting the hospital. “The Rustenburg economy is mostly driven by mining activities and, as part of this community, we recognised the need to lend a hand as this hospital serves our people,” he said. “It was befitting that the revamped ward was opened during Mandela Month as children and healthcare were undeniably very close to Madiba’s heart. We owe it to Tata to make a change in society, no matter how small it may be,” he added.
