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RIPPLE EFFECT AFTER FATAL STABBING OF LEARNER

Rustenburg - A 19-year-old suspect was arrested on Friday 2 June 2023 in connection with a fatal stabbing at the taxi rank. The 18-year-old victim, Lethabo Sibanda was a learner at the Hoër Tegniese Skool in Rustenburg.

Blessing Dintle Tladi, who is accused of murder and attempted murder, was remanded in police custody when he appeared before the Rustenburg Magistrates' Court on Monday 5 June.

Dintle is accused of stabbing Sibanda to death and injuring another youngster during an altercation. The two victims attended the same school.

Police spokesperson captain Sam Tselanvane said the case was postponed to Monday 12 June for a formal bail application.

Tselanyane said police received a complaint of a stabbing at the Rustenburg taxi rank at approximately 15:45 on 2 June. Upon arrival, people were gathered around the victim's motionless body which was covered with a blanket. "Preliminary investigations revealed that the victim was stabbed with a sharp object in his throat. According to bystanders, the victim was a learner from a high school in Rustenburg and he allegedly fought with another pupil from another school who in turn recruited a group of other learners to attack the victim's group," Tselanyane said.

A fight ensued between the two groups after they had gathered at the taxi rank, leading to the stabbing of the 18-year-old learner. "He was later certified dead at the scene," Tselanyane said.

Another learner, who was also allegedly stabbed by Tladi, was transported to a local hospital by Emergency Medical Rescue Services (EMRS). Police caught up with the 19-year-old suspect after

he had fled the scene and arrested him. Police are still investigating the incident.

Videos of fights breaking out at the victims' school spread like wildfire on social media on Wednesday 7 June. The incident has left learners restless and has placed school authorities on alert. "The school should rather be closed by the department until things have calmed down," a worried parent told Platinum Weekly

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CLAMP DOWN ON DRUGS AND **ILLEGAL ALCOHOL**

Brits – A 32-year-old man was arrested in De Wildt near Brits on Thursday 1 June 2023 for possession and dealing in drugs. Riaan Spies was nabbed after police discovered drug manufacturing equipment, chemicals, computer equipment and about 4,000 ecstasy tablets in his possession. "He was arrested during a multidisciplinary and crime intelligence driven operation after the team executed a search warrant," said police spokesperson brigadier Sabata Mokgwabone. Spies appeared before the Brits Magistrate Court on 2 June. He will be back in the same court on 9 June and is expected to apply for bail. In a separate incident, Rustenburg Crime Intelligence, Rustenburg K9, Public Order Police (POP) and detectives swooped in on illegal liquor outlets in Bokamoso on 2 June.

"The team raided and shut down three illegal liquor outlets and confiscated liquor worth R58,525,000 and other shebeen operating equipment," Mokgwabone said.

Fire at retirement home

Brits - The residents of Sonop Old Age home in Madibeng survived a fire that erupted in the independent living unit on Monday 5 June 2023 at around 10:30. Nobody was injured by the inferno.

Personnel from the Department of Social Development who were on duty worked hard to put out the fire. Thirty-four residents were safely evacuated from danger.

North West Department of Social Development spokesperson Petrus Siko said police are investigating the causes of the

"Six officials who were reported to have inhaled smoke were rushed to a nearby hospital to receive medical treatment and were discharged later in the afternoon," Siko said.

"As a department, we are pleased that no injuries or fatalities were reported during this incident. Our social workers will continue to provide psychosocial support in the form of counselling to the elderly including all our staff members at this facility," he added.



WATER SHORTAGES SPARK PROTESTS

Rustenburg – People living in Geelhout Park staged a protest on Friday 2 June along the R108 and Dr. Moroka road over water shortages. Solomon Moshima told Platinum Weekly that community members burnt tyres on the road and called for an end to the water shortages. "There has been a serious water

shortage for the past two weeks now," Moshima, resident of Geelhout Park, said, "We are paying for water services, so it's unacceptable that we have a shortage that goes on for such a long time," he added. Elsabe Augoustides, another Geelhout Park resident, said that there have been water shortages in the area for the past two years.

"Sometimes the water supply is restored, only for a couple of hours, and then there is no water again. Our houses are being devalued by these continuous water challenges," Augoustides said.

Ward 16 councillor Johan Cronje added: "In the last 4 years, I have handed in petitions to both the Rustenburg Local Municipality and Parliament. I have involved the Department of Water and Sanitation on both water and sanitation issues that are left for inordinate amounts of times unattended. I have also approached the human rights commission. Unfortunately, RLM have not reacted to any of these steps." Efforts to get a comment from the municipality on what steps they are taking to resolve the challenge were unsuccessful at the time of going to print.

FOUR IN HOT WATER OVER COUNTERFEIT GOODS

Rustenburg – Four people were each fined R1,500 on Monday 29 May 2023 for dealing in counterfeit goods during a crackdown by the police. Police spokesperson captain Sam Tselanyane said an operation targeting shops located at City Square Shopping Centre and Rustenburg Mall succeeded in flushing out the

The operation involved the Provincial Commercial Crime Investigation Unit (CCIU), Rustenburg Crime Intelligence (CI), South African Revenue Services (SARS), customs personnel and law

"During a search, counterfeit goods ranging from clothing, shoes, jewellery, perfumes, and handbags were confiscated. Some of the owners fled and abandoned their shops during the raid," Tselanyane said.

"The four were each issued with a fine of R1,500. The estimated value of all confiscated goods is about R14 million," Tselanyane added.

Beware of ATM pests

Rustenburg - Reports of attempted human trafficking at ATMs at the Caltex garage situated at the Buffelspark Centre in Buffelspoort have been circulating. However, Platinum Weekly communicated with the garage owner Linkie Staegemann on Monday 5 June 2023, who said that no such attempts were witnessed.

"ATM users are targeted at the centre, especially during monthend and on Fridays," said Linkie, "We are currently communicating with the banks to increase safety measures for our clients. Extra cameras will be added,

and we aim to move the ATMs closer together away from the parking area so that access can be better controlled. We are also aiming to add panic buttons which clients can use in case of an attempted robbery."

According to Linkie, there was wat appeared to be a personal altercation at an ATM on 27 May where a man got into a scuffle with another. On 30 May another incident occurred where an ATM user's card was taken by a perpetrator. However, camera footage shows no signs of attempted trafficking.

Unfortunately, ATM crimes are abundant almost everywhere. It should be noted that caution should be always exercised when using an ATM, regardless of the location, as ATM users are frequent targets.

Platinum Weekly received several complaints of ATM users being targeted at various locations across Rustenburg, therefor, when using an ATM, practice the following:

· Be alert of your surroundings; if you notice a suspicious person or vehicle, rather opt to use an ATM at another location or return at a different time

- Make sure that the ATM is in proper working order before using it; if anything appears unusual such as loose card slot, or a faulty keypad, don't use it.
- Try to take someone with you when using an ATM, especially if it's in a busy area.
- Don't scramble for your card, have it ready before approaching the ATM.
- · When using an ATM, cover the keyboard with your hand or purse. 1234 4568 1234 CARDHOLDER NAME CARDHOLDER NAME

• W h withdrawing money, cover the cash outlet with a handbag or with your body to ensure that onlookers can't see your cash withdrawal.

- Don't allow any distractions; if someone approaches you at an ATM, raise your voice demand for them to move away from the booth. This might deter them as onlookers may take note of what is happening.
- If you opt for a receipt, be sure not to leave it behind.
- Try not to do your shopping at the same location where you made a cash withdrawal. After your transaction, get into your vehicle and lock the doors as soon as possible before proceeding to another location—ensure that you aren't followed.

We can all save electricity'



SACH Accounting Solutions director Saul Chitate believes businesses can do a lot to mitigate the longterm effects of crippling electricity cuts.

Rustenburg - Will the country plunge into stage 8 load shedding during the coming days or weeks as the chills of winter continue to set in?

While this may be a very difficult question to answer, local businessman Saul Chitate believes that there is a lot everyone can do to save electricity to either try to avoid such community must now start thinking 'outside an eventuality or to cope when the lights are the box' to save power. turned off for longer periods.

Stage 8 load shedding would see the country thrust into darkness for 16 hours in every 32hour cycle, effectively putting power out for half the day, every day.

According to the Institute of Risk Management

South Africa (IRMSA), South Africa should the possibility of employees working flexible brace itself for the possibility of stage 8 load shedding in mid-winter.

Such a state-of-affairs is a threat to many sectors of the economy, and IRMSA has encouraged all sectors to explore and implement as many electricity usage reduction practices as possible.

"There are significant risks posed by the potential implementation of stage 8 midwinter load shedding, announced by Eskom. This development, we believe, presents a grave threat to the country's fragile economy and social fabric, and calls for immediate action from risk managers across all sectors," IRMSA said.

In an interview with Platinum Weekly on Wednesday 31 May 2023, Chitate, who is the director of SACH Accounting solutions, said businesspeople and ordinary members of the

"We have not really planned on how to cope with stage 8 load shedding but, if we get there, I will look at some of our employees working from home. We can all save electricity if we try," said Chitate.

"With limited electricity, you need to look at

hours and deciding who comes into the office and not, depending on if they have electricity at home," he added.

"Our systems are online so we are running on UPS on the Wi-Fi and if the laptops are fully charged, then you will be able to look at the loadshedding schedule and 'survive'.

"It will still come at a cost though, because if my employees are constantly working from home, I will still have to provide them with data," he added.

He encouraged businesses with the financial capacity to consider setting up electricity generation systems like solar panels or generators at their offices.

"In the 2023 budget, the minister introduced a tax incentive for businesses where if a business sets up a system that uses solar, green energy or other electricity generating systems. You can claim a 125% deduction cost," he advised.

"So, if you use R100,000 to set up that system, for example, you can claim R125,000 back as an expense for the year, which basically means you pay less tax. I would advise businesses to take advantage of this," he concluded.





(a) The factor of 0,3 represents the "fixed portion" of the costs. This is independent of the strength (or make-up of the sewage) and also deals with the conveyance costs.

(b) The above formula is only applicable for the treatment of compliant effluent. If any constituent (heavy metals, any toxic substances etc.) exceeds the approved values, the municipality may introduce any of the following steps:

. Refuse to accept the effluent

ii. Impose a fine on the industry

Insist on pre-treatment by the industry to render the effluent compliant prior to discharge to the municipal system.

(c) Fines for contravening the allowable limits of constituents in industrial effluents.

The municipality sells treated sewage effluent to the mines as process water. There is stringent quality criteria associated with this and the mines may refuse to accept sub-standard effluent. In this case the municipality must provide them with potable water at no incremental cost. The one major concern is fats and oils in the effluent as that impact negatively on the mines processes.

(e) The municipality will thus, in particular, enforce the fat and oil standards rigorously.

The fines will be implemented as follows:

i. First written warning. No fine

ii. Second contravention R10 000.00 fine regardless of quantity or quality

iii. Subsequent contraventions:

 \bullet Spot fines of the larger of R 10 000 or a flow related minimum fine of R5 per m3 or as per written approval

DARD ESTABLISHES PROVINCIAL TASK TEAM TO DEAL WITH ENERGY CRISIS

The Department of Agriculture and Rural Development has established provincial energy task team (PETA) to deal with energy crisis that is affecting the agricultural sector in the Province. The team's work amongst others will be to engage with Eskom to possibly exempt the sector looking at agro processing and public entities as food security is at high risk.

RURAL DEVELOPMENT

Department will roll out a mentorship programme in collaboration with the Agricultural Commodities Groups and Breeders Association in the current financial year. The programme will include the six (6) agricultural commodities aligned to the Agriculture and Agro-processing Master Plan (AAMP) as well as the apiculture for a period of twelve months.

Furthermore, a partnership with the national Department of Department of Agriculture, Land Reform and Rural Development (DALRRD). Agricultural Research Council and the North West University will see a total of 2500 farmers being empowered through farmer training and capacity building during the 2023 / 24 financial year.

The Department will resuscitate and strengthen designated groups formations, such as Women in Agriculture and Rural Development (WARD) and Youth in Agriculture and Rural Development (YARD) during the 2023/24 financial year.

A total of forty five (45) young farmers participating in the National Rural Youth Service Corps (NARYSEC) programme, are undergoing training through Kgora Farmer Training Centre as part of collaboration with the Department of Agriculture, Land Reform and Rural Development DALRRD.

JOB CREATION

As part of unlocking approximately 4 000 job opportunities in agriculture and related rural economic activities to address food insecurity at household level and rising unemployment in the province, various job creation interventions will be rolled out during the 2023/2024 financial year.

Producer Support and Development contribution will mostly be through CASP and Ilima/Letsema. Sustainable Resource Use and Management most contributions will be through Landcare Green Jobs and Rural Development to contribute mainly through EPWP, Rural Infrastructure projects, and Farmer Training which include mentorship as well as Learnership programmes. As for the Agricultural Support and Corporate Services, contributions will be through Agricultural Marketing Infrastructure, Colleges, Learnership and Internship programmes

AGRICULTURAL EDUCATION & TRAINING (AGRICULTURAL COLLEGES)

The Memorandum Of Understanding between the Department and North West University is already bearing fruits through the increased skills exchange in the area of arable farming. In the Financial Year 2023/2024, the Department will continue to reposition the Colleges as Centres of Excellence in Agriculture.

AGRICULTURAL DEVELOPMENT SERVICES

The Mining Development Agency (MDA) is partnering with the Department to develop communities by training farmers on the much needed and relevant skills and through this partnership. Sibanye mine funded the construction of an Agri-Hub through the MDA in Marikana near Rustenburg and is also developing and training farmers in the Dr Ruth Segomotsi Mompati District.

MARKETACCESS

To address the challenges of access to market by smallholder producers in the Province, the Department will this year enroll six more smallholder farmers to the South African Good Agricultural Practice (SA-GAP) Program. The SA-GAP program's main objective is to assist smallholder producers to access both local and international markets by producing good quality products that comply with food safety and quality standards as required by the market.

During the 12-month training programme, these smallholder producers will amongst others be empowered with efficient farm management practices, receive training to comply with legislation on food safety, environmental protection as well as animal and workers' welfare.

The certification programme ensures health and safety to consumers and helps producers to gain gradual recognition and acceptance from mainstream commercial markets.

In the previous financial year, the Department, in collaboration with Perishable Product Export Control Board (PPECB), implemented the South African Good Agricultural Practice (SAGAP) certification program. Since the inception of this programme, the department is proud to announce that fifteen (15) vegetable producers have been awarded compliance certificates, seven (7) in 2021/22 and eight (8) during the financial year 2022/23.

VILLAGE LIVESTOCK AUCTIONS PROGRAMME

To improve market access for agricultural products. the Department will this financial year launch three (3) more village livestock auctions in Ganyesa, Khunwana and Mogopa village. These village livestock auction facilities will be centrally established to benefit communities of these villages. From 2015 to date, the Department has already launched four (4) other Village Livestock Auctions in Driefontein, Taung, Tshidilamolomo and

MANAGEMENT SERVICES

The Integrated Provincial Forum on climate smart agriculture will be established encompassed of stakeholders from organised agricultural formations, the North West University, Environmental Services and Agricultural Research Council.

To further mitigate against disasters and advocate for climate smart practice, the department, South African Weather Services (SAWS), the provincial disaster forum and other stakeholders continue to raise awareness and provide advocacy on disaster

mitigations and undertake at least 96 awareness campaigns throughout the province.

Through the land care programme, a total of 100 hectares of fallow land will be brought back into production in the villages of Letlhogori and Koffiekraal.

The department aims to work on 2 000 hectares where no-till or minimum-till practices will be implemented.

RED MEAT COMMODITY

As part of contribution towards the red meat industry, during the 2022/23 financial year, the department targeted to support 150 red meat commodity farmers and total of 173 were successfully provided with tangible support.

For the 2023/24 financial year, the department has allocated 40% of its CASP on & off farm infrastructure budget towards the Red Meat production, targeting a minimum of 373 beneficiaries. The major deliverables of this programme comprise of livestock water provisioning, livestock handling facilities and erection of fence wherein we target communal areas and state-owned farms.

CROP PRODUCTION

Despite the climate change challenges, 10 124ha of hectares were planted for food production during the 2022/2023 in the Province. For this year, the Department has planned to put into production a total of 11 000 hectares across the four districts. The Department will also support farmers through production inputs such as diesel, seeds, fertilizers, agrochemicals and machinery.

PROGRAMMES TO EMPOWER NORTH WEST **FARMERS**

MEC Mohono outlined various public-private partnerships programmes that will empower farmers in four districts of the province. She announced that her Department will roll out of a mentorship programme in collaboration with the Agricultural Commodities Groups and Breeders Association in the current financial year. The programme will include the six (6) agricultural commodities aligned to the Agriculture and Agro-processing Master Plan (AAMP) as well as the apiculture for a period of 12

ENGINEERING SERVICES

Through the help of the Engineering Council of South Africa (ECSA), the department will assign a mentor for its four candidate engineers and one engineering technician to ensure that the candidates become professionally registered and capacitated.

CANNABIS ROLL-OUT PROGRAMME

Following a successful Cannabis Lekgotla held in partnership with the North-West University, at least twenty-two (22) hemp farmers have been trained and two of these farmers were supported during the previous financial year. Part of the support the Department gave include drilling, sighting and equipping of bore holes, and in the current financial, the Department will be supporting one hemp farmer this financial year.

HIGHLIGHTS



The Department of Economic Development Environment, Conservation and Tourism mandate is continuing in ensuring the creation of a conducive environment for economic growth to take place within the North West Province. In achieving this, the department will continue to forge partnership with the private sector to ensure job creation and transfer of skills for the development and growth of businesses operating within North West Province.

The total allocation 2023/24 financial year for the department is R1009 340 000 and summary is as follows:

DEPARTMENTAL PROGRAMMES

The department will during this financial year implement the following programmes:

1. INTEGRATED ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT SERVICES:

1.1. Business Turn around Support:

The department is implementing this programme in partnership with Productivity South Africa. The programme is allocated an amount of R 5 million to support 10 new qualifying Small Medium, Micro Enterprises (SMMEs) across all the sector.

1.2. Incubation establishment and support program

The department is implementing this programme in partnership with Productivity South Africa. The programme is allocated an amount of R5 million to support 10 new qualifying Small Medium, Micro Enterprises (SMMEs) across all the sector.

1.3. Township Bakery Support Programme

The department will offer assistance for the replacement of old equipment and skills development to existing bakeries. The intervention will provide for the resuscitation of 29 bakeries in the four districts, R1.3 million has been allocated to that effect.

1.4. Youth Tyre Fitment Centre Programme

In continuing to support Public Private Partnership (PPP), the departmenthaspartneredwith DUNLOP for the establishment of 10 youth owned small scale tyre fitment centres around the Province. Each fitment centre, will receive a branded and fully fitted container to the value of R370 000. The programme will create 50 jobs for young people.

1.5. Departmental Empowerment Fund

An amount of R15 million has been set aside to fund the procurement of equipment for start-ups and an existing small business enterprises. The fund was established to offer support to small businesses and cooperatives operating within the North West Province with equipment worth R100000 for start-ups and R200 000 for existing businesses. The fund excludes those in the liquor & gambling industries, costs associated with tendering, cost of acquiring property (including renovations)

constructions, fire and ammunition, primary agriculture and transport.

1.6. Informal Business Support

This programme will be implemented through NWDC to support municipalities in creating informal traders market that will establish retail distribution enterprise in villages and townships linked to wholesalers. The programme is allocated R7 million for this financial year.

1.7. Domestic Trade Markets

The department and its two entities (North West Development Corporation and newly merged North West Parks and Tourism Board - NWP&TB) has partnered with Department of Small Business Development (DSBD), District and Local municipalities collaborated to establish Trade market and permanent Flea Market. The programme is allocated an amount of R8 million to co-fund the identified trade market sites and permanent flea market.

1.8. Online Market Platform

A total of R1.3 million has been set aside for the establishment of online marketing platform. The platform is intended to enhance the digital content of showcasing products of the North West Province businesses.

1.9. Comprehensive Business Development Support

This intervention provides small business enterprises with business development support services, to enhance growth and acceleration, including access to markets, product development and skills development. An amount of R6 million has been allocated to support the sustainability of 1 200 new beneficiaries under this programme to create jobs and improve turn over.

1.10. Enterprise Support Centres (Co-location model)

The intervention is intended to provide outreach to Rural and Township Areas. Enterprise Information Centres established are based at Lebotloane, Mokgalwaneng, Ganyesa, Tswelelang, Mathibestad and Logagane and they play a very important role of empowering community in terms of business development. During this financial year, the programme will be handed over to NWDC for further implementation.

An amount of R1.5 Million has been allocated for the 2023/2024 financial year for the support of information centres in the province.

2. TRADE AND SECTOR DEVELOPMENT

- The Special Economic Development project which is implemented through NWDC has been allocated a total of R36.4 million for the implementation of its operations.
- Private Sector is on board with investment on construction of R115 million for two solar farms
- An amount of R30 million has been allocated to support the process of exploring economic opportunities within the alternative energy value chain.

3. TOURISM GROWTH AND DEVELOPMENT

3.1. Provincial Tourism Sector Strategy

The programme will continue with the implementation of the Provincial Tourism Sector Strategy.

3.2. Taung Hotel School Infrastructure Programme

Anamount of R18 million has been allocated for the renovations and refurbishment of the Taung Hotel School and the main hotel building as well as initiatives towards growing tourism in the province.

3.3 Merger of two entities:

North West Parks and Tourism Board (NWPTB) was established as a result of merger between the North West Parks Board and North West Tourism Board in 2022. The merger was formed under the North West Parks and Tourism Act 02 of 2022, and it came into effect from the 1st April 2023. The newly North West Parks and Tourism Board will implement the following programmes:

3.3.1. Training and business development

An amount of **R14,7 million** is allocated for both Taung and Mahikeng Hotel Schools operations, to increase the number of academic courses offered as well as Student Academic and Tourism SMMEs Training Programme.

3.3.2. North West Tourism Marketing Strategy:

The province will continue implementation of North West Tourism Marketing Strategy to position the province as a preferred tourism destination.

3. BUSINESS REGULATION

This is the programme which comprises of Consumer, Liquor and business regulations sub-programmes:

- the department will conduct compliance inspections in each district to ensure businesses compliance with the Consumer Protection Act, Liquor Act, as amend and other relevant legislations.
- Department will continue to protect consumers where their rights were infringed by unscrupulous business owners.
- Adjudication of consumer cases by North West Provincial Consumer Court.
- Continue to create awareness on consumer, liquor and business regulations.

3.4. North West Gambling Board:

The entity is responsible for the regulation of the gambling industry in the North West. The plans for the board is as follows:

- Four (04) Casino License Holders (Sun City, Peermont (Pty) in Mahikeng Ltd, Peermont (Pty) Ltd in KlerksdorpO and Bingo Operators have pledged to embark on the socioeconomic program of eradicating pit toilets, upgrading of sports & recreational facilities and early childhood centres to two previously disadvantaged schools in the area of their operations.
- An RFA (Request For Applications) for the fifth casino license for interested parties to apply will be issued
- Roll out of LPM licenses for the remaining 1500 machines which will contribute to revenue collection in the province.
- An activation of 9 bookmaker licenses will create 300 job opportunities;
- The horse racing formally known as the Bray Horse Racing will be resuscitated and rollout in all districts.

4. ENVIRONMENT AND CONSERVATION

The department through newly NWPTB will implement the following conservation projects:

- An amount of RS million allocated for patching of potholes at Pilanesberg Nature Reserve.
- Another R5 million will be used for upgrading of fences in all our game reserves in the province. This is done in order to curb the escape of wild animals which pose danger to communities.
- R2 million for drilling of boreholes in Molopo and Madikwe Game Reserves.
- R8 million for the restoration of Kgaswane Nature Reserve after severe floods that hit the area.

Through Environmental services:

- In an effort to reduce the effect of climate change, the department will continue to engage relevant stakeholders.
- Offer support to three district municipalities (Ngaka Modiri Molema, Dr Ruth Segomotsi Mompati and Dr Kenneth Kaunda) by performing Atmospheric Emission Licensing function on their behalf.
- Review the Provincial Integrated Waste Management Plan (PIWMP) as per Section 11 (1) of NEMWA (Act 59 of 2008), to ensure alignment to all relevant legislations.

5. DEPARTMENTAL JOB CREATION INITIATIVES

A total amount of R26 million has been allocated for job creation initiatives targeting one thousand and seventy (1070) young people in the 4 districts of the Province and the breakdown is as follows:

- Tourism and Hospitality placement program is targeting 100 youth
- Business Regulation is targeting to employ 200 data captures
- IEDS road patching and marks: 120 youth
- Environment EPWP program: 450 youth
- North West Parks and Tourism Board: 230 youth
- Gambling Board: 300 jobs.

In addition to the above the department together with its strategic partners namely the South African Institute of Professional Accountants (SAIPA), the Institute of Business Advisors Southern Africa (IBASA) and Services SETA collaborated to unlock business advisory service opportunities. A new cohort of 100 learners will be registered in the programme during this financial year. The program is to develop a cohort of young Business Advisors who will be able to provide business advisory services needed by SMMEs and Co-operatives to turnaround and sustain their business ventures.

The use of Non-Motorised Transport is promoted through the implementation of the National Rural Transport Strategy. To this end the Department distributed bicycles to learners who walk less than five kilometres to school and we also donated Animal Drawn Carts (ADC) to communities who rely and use this mode of transport especially in rural villages.

For the 2022/2023 financial year, the Department donated twenty (20) animal drawn carts in the villages of Dibono and Mmanawana outside Mahikeng. The donation was done at the request of the community which has for years being utilising the carts as a means of transport.

TRANSPORT REGULATIONS

In an effort to contribute towards poverty alleviation, job creation and ultimately reduce number of crashes involving strayanimals, the department has successfully appointed One Hundred and Thirty (130) Road Safety Rangers and Scholar Patrol Volunteers. The appointment of these community members was done in partnership with local municipalities, traditional authorities and the farming unions. The budget allocated for this project was about three million and twentynine thousand Rand (R3 029 000.00)

In September 2021 we appointed the North West Public Transport Intervention Team (NWPTIT) in line with Section 10, (1a) of the Act. The Team was given thirty-five (35) cases to attend to. It is with pleasure to report that twenty-nine (29) of these cases have been resolved, which translate into eightytwo percent (82%) achievement.

The Department has entered into the Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) with SANTACO, which is the highest national structure and the mouth piece of the sector, the Provincial Taxi Council (PTC) which is the highest Provincial structure and all Regional Taxi Councils (RTCs). The rationale behind this approach is to ensure no recurrence of incidents and pro activeness and stability within the sector.

We have set aside a budget of seven (07) million Rand for the upgrade of the Zeerust Weighbridge. The project is envisaged to be completed within three years. The work involved includes plans to replace the current scale with a 24-meter multideck scale that will contribute more accurate and efficient weighing environment where overload management will contribute to a reduction of the road infrastructure damage.

To strengthen and extend law enforcement visibility during this financial year, we have recruited fifty-three (53) traffic learners, thirty-two (32) of whom are females and twenty-one (21) are males. They underwent a twelve (12) months training on Road Traffic Management Diploma in Mpumalanga Traffic Training College. Fifty-one (51) of them have completed the training and graduated in December last year. These learners are currently appointed by the department as Traffic Wardens on a contract of three (3) months after which they will be absorbed permanently as Provincial Inspectors, contributing to increasing law enforcement visibility in all four district of the Province.

We will also intensify visibility on N4, N12, N14 and N18 in an effort to reduce fatal crashes and fatalities. To ensure we reach this goal, the Department has purchased 24 high powered vehicles to address the shortage of vehicles and increase traffic visibility on our roads.

To ensure that the issued traffic fines are paid, we will deploy three (03) minibuses equipped with systems to identify motorists who failed to pay their traffic fines or to appear in court on the prescribed dates. These minibuses will be deployed in all four districts. So it's a game over for everyone who has an outstanding traffic fine.

The North West MEC for Community Safety and Transport Management, J.S. Lehari tabled Departmental Budget

In his speech MEC Lehari highlighted achievements recorded in the last financial year 2022/2023 and further outlined the plans to speed-up service delivery in this financial year 2023/2024.

Amongst the highlights of MEC's speech are on how the Department will continue rising to the occasion and respond well to the service delivery expectations and the needs of communities of the North West Province at large, despites different challenges that keeps emerging throughout.

The Department MEC committed continuous stakeholder and community mobilisation in the fight again crime, reduction of road incidents and fatalities and provide effective and efficient transport system.

PROVINCIAL CIVILIAN SECRETARIAT FOR POLICE

The Department mobilized communities and stakeholders in implementing programmes across the four (4) Districts of the Province as per SAPS crime trends and patterns, which included but not limited to:

- Crime Prevention Through Environmental Design, Prevention of Gender Based Violence Against Vulnerable Groups, Anti Gangsterism, School Safety Programme, Rural Safety, example stock theft, anti-dangerous weapons campaigns and Campaign against Substance Abuse.
- » Programmes were implemented in partnership with key role players inclusive of civil society, FBOs, non-governmental organisations (NGOs), non-profit organisations (NPOs) and Government departments
- » The Department supported and funded thirtynine (39) Non-Profit Institutions - Community Policing Forums (CPFs) and Non Profit Organisations (NPOs) to ensure that crime prevention initiatives are intensified in communities. A total of sixty-three (63) CPFs were assessed on functionality and capacity building workshops were conducted in the four (04) Districts to enhance their ability to participate in the prevention of crime by implementing the Community Policing Strategy

In strengthening the fight against crime, the Department collaborated with priority police stations through the Community in Blue programme and created temporary employment by appointing 400 Community Safety Patrollers across the four (04) Districts, through the Extended Public Works Programme (EPWP).

Although there was a challenge in establishing and resuscitating Community Safety Forums (CSFs), the Department has conducted engagements and made presentations to the majority of Municipal Councils in securing resolutions to establish the structures in such municipalities. To date only two Council Resolutions were received from Kgetleng Rivier and Moses Kotane Local Municipalities.

The Province gained two new police stations, which began operating in the financial year 2022/2023, and those are the Moeka Vuma and Mabeskraal Police Stations. These stations assisted in reducing the load carried by Makapanstad and Sun City police stations respectively by bringing services closer to the communities they serve.

TRANSPORT OPERATIONS

The department continued with the provision of subsidised commuter services in the Dr Ruth Segomotsi Mompati, Bojanala Platinum and Ngaka Modiri Molema District Municipalities. The department was faced with financial challenges due to the high costs associated with transport indices which were rebased by Statistics South Africa in 2021. A business case was made to National Department of Transport which in its adjustment budget gave a further ninety-seven million Rand (R97, 7) to address imminent accruals which has an impact on budget. 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
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Conquering the Monster!
